POLICY FOR BARKING DOG COMPLAINTS

State Statute 22-363 - Owning or keeping a dog as such to create a nuisance.

Be of the opinion that all complaints will end up as a court case, therefore consider the following:

- I. Try not to go to court on a one to one basis. Two complaints or a disinterested party and a complainant are best.
- II. The Judge must be convinced that a dog is a nuisance due to excessive barking.
- III. A letter from a doctor will be needed if the complainant is under a doctors' care.

GENERAL POLICY UPON A COMPLAINT

- I. First complaint. Verbal and deterrent. No statement needed.
 - A. Advise the accused of the complaint
 - B. Offer advice that may solve the problem.
 - 1. Take the dog inside.
 - 2. Relocate the dog.
 - 3. Eliminate the cause of barking.
 - A. Sight.
 - B. Sound.
 - C. Advise **both** the complainant and the accused that if the problem continues that the following will be done.
 - 1. The complainant will be advised to keep a detailed log of the time and duration of the barking. (Detailed Log will be kept for a *minimum* of ten days)
 - 2. A second complainant will be found or a disinterested party will be needed to substantiate the complaint.
 - 3. Where a sick person is involved, a letter from that person's doctor will be required.
- II. Second complaint. Infraction will be issued. Statement and detailed log from complainant needed.
 - A. A copy of the written detailed log along with a statement will be taken from the complainant.
 - B. A second complainant, or a disinterested party, will be contacted to substantiate the complaint.
 - C. An infraction will be given to the dog owner.
- III. Third complaint. Summons issued. Statement and additional detailed log needed.
 - A. A copy of the second detailed log will be taken along with a statement from the complainant.
 - B. A second complainant, or a disinterested party, will be contacted to substantiate the complaint.
 - C. A summons will be issued.
- IV. If at anytime an officer responds to the accused address and the dog is barking said officer can request that the dog be brought inside. At the discretion of the officer, an infraction can be issued.
